Gospel Bracelet Leads Client to Jesus

Angela Jaramillo recently returned from Guatemala where she and her team members used the Gospel bracelet to share the message of Jesus with the Guatemalans. (*See story on page 6*)

Now back home, Angela was committed to use her Gospel bracelet in her mentoring role at Agape. She had just finished mentoring Erica Hancock when she remembered that she had not shared the bracelet message with her. Erica was already shopping for her birthday gift in the Gift Shop when Angela caught up with her. Angela told Erica how she had used this bracelet to share the message of the Gospel in Guatemala recently, and asked Erica if she would like to hear it. Erica was very interested as Angela explained: "The first bead is yellow, representing the streets of gold in heaven, a place where there can be no sin. The second bead is black, representing the sin that each of us has. The red bead represents the blood that Jesus shed when He died for our sins, and the white bead represents the cleansing of our hearts that occurs when we accept Jesus as our Savior. When a person admits they are a sinner, believes that Jesus died to take the punishment for that sin, and then chooses to receive Jesus as their Savior, He forgives sins. The green bead represents growing in new life as a child of God."

Erica accepted Jesus in the Gift Shop as her two daughters watched. She said, "I am excited to have someone explain to me how to be a Christian. I had not understood this before."

Erica was interested in finding a church and recalled that an invitation had recently arrived in her mail, regarding a new church near her home in Union Hall. Carol Moyer, Member Church Liaison, was working in the Pantry and came out to help connect Erica and her girls to the church, which was recently 'planted' in Union Hall by Franklin Heights Baptist Church. So now Erica and her girls are on their way to growing as Christians!

The Gospel Bracelet (left), also known as the Salvation Bracelet, originated as the Wordless Book, a book with pages the colors of gold, black, red, white, and green. It was invented in 1866 by famous London Baptist preacher, Charles Spurgeon. Several hundred orphans were the first to be introduced to the Wordless Book, and since then, the books and bracelets have been used around the world to share in the simple, understandable way how much God loves us and has provided a way to be a part of His family.

He will be assisting Pantry Director, Judy Harper, in all aspects of Pantry management, including the interaction with Feeding America, and other organizations who provide groceries and other products for the Pantry. Mission Trip Puts Faith Into Action for Two Agape Mentors

Debbie Cocrane and Angela Jaramillo recently went on their first foreign mission trip; they travelled to Guatemala with about 45 others from nine churches in Virginia and Louisiana. Debbie is from EastLake Community Church and Angela is from Blue Ridge Community Church. They both volunteer as Agape Mentors; Debbie also is a Floor Supervisor and Angela also works as a runner.

Debbie says, "I had always wanted to go to share the good news with people who didn't know it. When this trip was announced, I was available and I wanted to be obedient to Jesus' command to tell others about His love." When Angela found out Debbie was going, "I immediately knew this was the opportunity I had been praying for 8 years. It was in my heart to have this experience because of the joy I have through Jesus, especially whenever I serve others. My sister, Louisa, also went; it was her first mission trip as well."

Debbie continued, "Initially, I didn't know what we would be doing, so I just had to trust that God would provide the work I was to do. As it turned out, there were three nurses, so we decided to provide medical clinics with a local doctor. I had face-

to-face contact with everyone who came to the clinic and it was very humbling to see their appreciation for our help. The primary complaints were intestinal

parasites, which we were able to provide medicine that would be effective for one year."

Angela, originally from Columbia, provided interpreter services for two of the clinics. She also spent time with the abuelitos - grandparents. A local ministry offers a daily program for grandparents, which includes a nutritious breakfast, Bible study, worship and socializa-

tion. Angela took photos of each abuelito with her phone. She says, "That was a highlight for them. They were so excited to see their photos."

The team brought about 500 pairs of shoes and Angela was part of the distribution team, bringing the shoes to a local school, washing the children's feet and giving them a pair of shoes that fit them. Debbie was able to do home visits and to pray blessings on the families and their homes.

The team used handmade Gospel bracelets to explain the message of Jesus top) helped distribute over 500 pairs of throughout their week in Guatemala. That has given both of them boldness and

renewed energy to share this message wherever they are. Debbie has been able to distribute and explain the Gospel message with several of her Agape clients, and their children. She said, "I didn't realize the boldness I got from this mission." Angela travelled to Europe after her mission, and was able to share the message of the Gospel with several people due to wearing her bracelet. Angela concluded, "What I got from the trip is how faithful God is. I wake up early each day to spend time with God. On this trip, He kept waking me earlier each day so I could spend more time with Him before my day started. I especially asked God to keep me healthy so I could fully serve each day, and to keep me alert to all that He has for me. Every day I was healthy; I was full of joy; I was strong; I had peace knowing that His word will not return void. I felt the intentionality of each day, and I came home with the same expectation: that God will make me alert each day to His presence and His direction for me."

Patsy Clairmont was born in Detroit in 1945. Her father was a milkman, her mom a homemaker. Patsy took after her mom and was only five feet tall. During her childhood, her mom had bouts of depression. Patsy was later diagnosed with a form of agoraphobia.

Patsy and Les were married when she was only seventeen and Les, eighteen. Les was sent to Kentucky to finish training and for assignment by the US Army to Germany.

Upon the birth of their son, Patsy's behavior became frenzied. Her depression and lack of interest in life continued to grow. She was enrolled in Recovery, Inc by her doctor for treatment. This laid the groundwork for her recovery. Patsy found her way back to the Lord, as she learned to face her fears through her faith and by God's grace. She prayed and searched the scriptures and through God's grace, learned to accept the good things God had planned for her.

She became a book reviewer for Christian books, and ultimately, the Lord turned that into a full-time speaking and writing ministry. Her experience shows how the Lord uses the broken and unlikely in many situations. Thank God for that!

This was a beautiful story showing that our precious Lord can and will use us no matter how broken we are if we will just look to Him for our strength. DD
