God Is My Most Effective 'Nerve' Pill

"I was having so much trouble breathing, I couldn't even say where to go—the doctor's office or the emergency department (ED). I thought I was dying, but at the same time, I felt God's hands on my shoulders. He was saying, "I can let you go, or I can help you." I couldn't speak, for lack of oxygen, but in my mind, I was crying out for help."

Brenda Divers, an Agape client since 2013, says, "I owe Him; I owe Him my life. Even though I had been

saved for many years, in that moment, I truly understood that **He Had Me!**"

She later told her daughter-in-law, who had taken her to the hospital, that God was in the car with them. "I was talking to Him. I saw the back of His head, with His arms on my shoulders in the visor mirror. She didn't believe me, and insisted that I had been conversing with her the entire trip to the ED. Then she challenged me to look inside the car. There were no mirrors on either of the car's visors! But yet, I know I saw Him and heard His voice.

"I returned home a few days later after being hospitalized, and my son saw the half-carton of cigarettes on the counter. I had said I didn't need to smoke anymore, so he took the carton. I have not had a single cigarette in my mouth or in my hand since June, 2018. I don't need them anymore. God completely took away my desire. Only God could do this; I'd been smoking for 51 years, since I was 17 years old!'

Brenda concluded, "I used to tell people that cigarettes were the best nerve pill I'd ever had. Now my nerve pill is God! I read my Bible every day, even when I don't understand it. I know this is a miracle that only God could do in my life, and I am very thankful."


Jan Hogle, an Agape Mentor, Trainer, and Coordinator of the Getting Ahead Program, doesn't just pour herself out for our Agape clients, but annually has travelled to the Czech Republic to share her love of Jesus. In May, Jan was a part of a six-member team sent by International Messengers to conduct an English as a second language "camp" for adults in picturesque Malenovice, Czech Republic. She was responsible for creating and conducting morning workshops, including one on generations called "Mind the Generation Gap". (She gave a "dry run" of this workshop to Agape volunteers several months ago which really helped a lot.) She also taught English, Bible reading and conversation classes each day.

What's the connection with Agape love? Jan explains, "Just as we show unconditional "agape" love to our clients here in Moneta, Virginia, so our Czech team determined and prayed to do the same for our 17 students. We went where they were — physically and spiritually — rather than preaching our position. We listened intently and had such rich deep conversations and interactions with these precious men and women. The amazing thing about this kind of active listening is that it opens the door for them to want to listen to us.

One example Jan told was of a young man who asked her how long she had been married. His question was really a cry for help as he was having marriage problems. He asked Jan how she and her husband had made it to over 50 years of marriage. She was able to respond that "God was and is the glue of our marriage. Later, a teammate followed up with a 3 -hour conversation during which she listened and then shared a little of her own marital story, describing how Jesus had been the essential healing power for her and her husband!"



Susan Parris is thirty-four years old. She has two small children and works in a bank as marketing director. Her husband, Stan, is a pastor.

Suddenly and without warning, Susan finds a small lump in her breast. After her mammogram with ultrasound and biopsy, Susan is diagnosed with breast cancer. So begins the surgery, chemo, and illness that comes with it. Susan asked the same questions that all of us ask when we are given such a diagnosis: What did I do wrong? Why did this happen to me? What do I do now?

Susan is a Christian and has a beautiful relationship with Christ. She also has a large number of friends that are Christians and they all prayed for her to win this battle. They knew that God is in control of all the seasons of our lives.

Susan hopes to pay it forward to others faced with illnesses. She can now actually use her own personal experiences as she witnesses to others that are lost and hurting. Susan thanks God that she can proudly say, "I am a cancer survivor."

STUDENTS: Staunton River High School Students Serve

Twelve students from Staunton River High School spent their first week of summer vacation serving their local community through a camp program, Leadership through Service. The Twenty-First Century program is a federally-funded three-year grant, which affords students the opportunity to explore service in their local community. Michelle Kist, co-sponsor of the program, said, "This program is designed to specifically offer students extra-curricular service activities they might not otherwise be involved in. Each day throughout the week, the students worked at a different local non-profit, learning about the agency's mission, the needs being addressed and the people being served. The majority of the students had no idea of the needs in our community, nor the organizations who provided services."

At Agape, the students worked in the Toy Department and in the Clothing Department. They were amazed at the mountain of clothing donations, and especially enjoyed cleaning, repairing, and organizing the toys for Christmas gifts for area children.

The program is open to all students, from rising freshmen to rising seniors. The program not only benefits the students with a broader sense of their community, but helps with job opportunities and scholarship options in the future. Kist, a Spanish teacher, and Shannon Thomas, an English teacher, volunteered to sponsor the program and felt it was very worthwhile. Kist concluded, "The students felt very welcomed and appreciated by the Agape volunteers, and that made them feel like their time was well-spent. This is the first year the program was offered, and based on the feedback from the students, we are considering the possibility of a year-round program. We definitely hope to do it again."
